FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Friends,

Last week we looked at the first of three key factors that marked out the life of John Flavel, and that we would do well to seek to cultivate as we head into this new year. So having thought briefly about his strong faith, this week we turn to his great hope.

A GREAT HOPE

Almost every few days it seems that there are fresh warnings about the strain that various winter viruses are putting on the NHS. I've seen first hand the long rows of ambulances lined up outside A+E because there are no beds for the patients they have brought in. But even in the days of Covid, the threat to life was far lower than the *Preacherman of Dartmouth* faced in his day.

In the short biography I mentioned last week, Flavel records how he and his brother travelled to London and found the mass grave of plague victims into which the bodies of their parents had been thrown. How they saw fresh bodies being carried in on carts. How they coated their shoes with lime before leaving, to try and prevent the disease spreading. Those were desperate days. Add to that the threat to life for those preaching the gospel outside the established church, either from beatings or imprisonment in disease-riddled prisons, and to describe life as precarious would not be an exaggeration.

If we are truly honest, life today is only slightly less precarious. We generally assume that we will live long and healthy lives, and many of us are blessed with that, but the harsh truth is that our lives could end at any moment. A blood clot. A car crash. A simple fall and hit your head. Even in our relatively safe country life is, and will always be, precarious.

How does one live in times with that thought?

Many would close their eyes to the truth and pretend that they will live forever, refusing e speak or think of death. But if we do that, we are only fooling ourselves. Storing up problems for later.

What we need is a hope that is stronger than death. Such a hope would allow us to be honest about the facts of life and face the inevitability of our death with confidence, so that we can live wholeheartedly in the present with an unshakeable hope for the future. Flavel had that. He had learned, as St Paul did: that for him to live was Christ, and to die was gain. So, whilst John

Flavel never sought out danger nor put himself at risk, he refused to run and hide from God's calling on his life.

What about us?

Are we certain that by his death on the cross Jesus accomplished all that is necessary for us to be forgiven and have eternal life? Do we know for certain that Jesus is <u>our</u> Saviour? Is our trust in God so strong, that it allows us to live with risk and be willing to face loss all for the sake of Christ, if that is what God calls us to do?

For the unbeliever death is something to be feared. A monster that cannot be conquered, no matter how many times we sing 'Imagine' or 'Somewhere over the rainbow.'

But for the Christian, the one with a solid and active trust in our death-defeating super-saviour, death can truly to be said to have lost its sting. That means that life can be lived without terror or apprehension, and death, when it comes, can be embraced as a friend, a pleasant doorway through which we can pass with confidence because we know that the Good Shepherd who has walked with us through life will take us through death and into his eternal kingdom, where we will be with him forever. As Flavel himself put it: 'Jesus, our head, is already in heaven; and if the head be above water, the body cannot drown.'

So how great is your hope? The more we look to Jesus, the more we consider his death and resurrection, the more we know of his Word and promises, the stronger our hope will grow.


