FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Friends

'Some time later Paul said to Barnabas, "Let us go back and visit the believers in all the towns where we preached the word of the Lord and see how they are doing." Acts 15: 36

Last Sunday I had the pleasure of taking the 11am BCP Holy Communion Service at St Mary's Wolborough. It might surprise you to know that I really enjoy the Book of Common Prayer communion service, but I do. However, this was sadly my first visit to St Mary's this year.

Herein lies one of the problems with a multi-church Parish, particularly one with some churches not having services every week due to fewer clergy than the number of churches. And so last Sunday I felt a little bit like Paul in Acts 15, going back to a place he hadn't been to for some time to see how the people were doing.

So, despite all the many benefits and strengths of our multi-church parish (and do go back and read last week's article if you have forgotten what they are) there are some difficulties and weaknesses too, and not being able to be with a congregation every week is certainly one of them. And if we are to be able to mitigate them as far as possible, we need to be honest and name them. So, let's do that. Let me suggest 7. Again, if you can think of some more, do please let me know:

We miss seeing our friends. Many of you will have friends who usually worship in different churches on a Sunday, so we don't see them as often as we might.

We miss out on worshipping as a large congregation. There's something wonderful about being part of a large vibrant congregation- such as we experience on a 5th Sunday. That would be the case every week if we all worshipped together, but instead our attendances range from the high teens to the early 50s. Smaller is fine - and has its benefits - but it can make us feel more vulnerable against the world.

A lack of Sunday services in every church. In an ideal world, every church would have a service every Sunday. All the statistics show that this is the best way to grow a church, and yet we do not currently have the human resources to make this possible.

A weakening of pastoral care. Whilst some people will enjoy seeing and hearing from different clergy over a month, it does have its impact on the depth of relationships between pastor and

congregation. Weeks can go by without seeing the same minister, and for 9:30 a.m. congregations, the minister is often rushing off somewhere else! This means a lack of time with people, and that pastoral care from clergy to people is not as strong as it might be.

5 buildings to look after. Our buildings are a physical witness and all have their beauty, but looking after 5 ancient church buildings is a huge undertaking- both in terms of time and cost. This means that some churches have to wait longer than they might like for repairs or maintenance works to be done.

A lack of theological diversity. Whilst we have liturgical variety and varying musical styles across our churches, it's fair to say that sharing 2 full time clergy means that the theological diversity, which one might expect of 5 separate churches is not as wide as many would like. That makes it...

Harder to agree on priorities and make plans that suit everyone. Whether it is the times of our services, where we celebrate Christmas, which mission agencies to support, or how to respond to more contentious issues, being 5 churches united in 1 parish makes it harder to function as a united body.

Next week I'll suggest some ways we might mitigate these difficulties. But for now, can I ask that you start to reflect and pray about these challenges- and others you think of.

For better or worse, for richer or poorer, in sickness and in health, we are 5 church communities now joined in one parish. So let us prayerfully seek ways to grow stronger together.





Share your views about the next Archbishop of Canterbury. People across the Church of England and the Anglican Communion are being invited to share their views about the qualities, values and vision the next Archbishop of Canterbury will ideally have. The public consultation is running until 28 March. The process to find the new Archbishop of Canterbury is currently underway following the resignation of Justin Welby in January. Parish Electoral Roll: The complete revision of the electoral roll this year.

Every six years, everyone who wishes to join or remain on the roll must fill in an application form. If you are not familiar with the electoral roll, it's a way of identifying with the parish as the place where you believe you have been called to worship and serve. Basically it's 'church membership' allowing you to vote for members of the PCC and church wardens at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting in May, and to serve on the PCC or as a church warden if you are nominated and elected.

It doesn't cost anything to join, although we encourage you to prayerfully consider regular giving – information on the Parish Giving Scheme is available in your church.

So, if you're over 16, baptised or confirmed in the Church of England, (or baptised in another trinitarian Christian denomination), living and regularly worshipping in our churches, there's nothing to prevent you from joining.


Forms are available in your church from this Sunday, please complete and return your form as soon as possible. If you require further information please speak to the clergy, your churchwarden or PCC members.


Lent Devotional: Our Lent devotional is now available in our churches. Offering readings and recollections for each of the 40-days of Lent, and priced at just £1, it would be a wonderful investment for the coming season. Details are below.

Matt Searles: In Quietness and Trust:

Early in his ministry, Jesus gave his followers a description of how he wants his people to live. Rather than seeking to ascend to God, Christian discipleship is a downward flourishing; a countercultural way of blessing. These 40 devotions, with a daily reading and short reflection, will guide you through the beatitudes Jesus gave in the Sermon on the Mount. This Easter, join Jesus on his path to the cross, and see that his way - though so different to the way of the world – leads to freedom, joy, and life. This book has eight groups of five devotions, with each group focusing on the theme of one of the beatitudes from Matthew's gospel. Each day there is a verse or passage from Scripture with an accompanying devotion, a prayer and a song. The songs can be found online, but you can also find them on a Spotify playlist called 'In Quietness and Trust - Lent Playlist'.
