FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Friends.

In the last of our current short series on the heroes from Hebrews 11 (we may return to the list in due course) I want to highlight Rahab. You can read Rahab's story in Joshua chapter 2, and I want to bring out 3 important points from her story that make her stand out as person of real faith.

Rahab's background was no bar to coming to God- for God's grace is available to all.

Both Joshua 2 and Hebrews 11 describe Rahab as a prostitute, and although there has recently been debate as to whether the Hebrew word used might better be translated as innkeeper, her behaviour in saving the Hebrew spies (denying associations with people and refusing to acknowledging that certain men had been in her house) were almost certainly part of the etiquette of her profession.

But what Rahab was when she encountered the God of Israel is unimportant. Rahab recognised God's power and decided to trust her own life, and the lives of her families to Him. And when Jericho fell, she and her family joined God's people and lived with them, taking Israel's God to be their God. How amazing is that!

Rahab's conduct was far from perfect- but God's works on us gradually.

As I commented above, Rahab's lies and deceit, which were part of her old life, fell far short of the honesty and truthfulness that the law of God demands. Perhaps we might argue that her lies saved lives, and they did; or that in times of war, different rules apply. But still, it's clear that Rahab's line of work and her lies and deceit were things that had to change.

We don't know to what extent that happened, but God used Rahab long before her character had been changed. In the same way, God still calls us to serve him when we are still far from perfect. There never have been any perfect saints, and there never will be this side of Glory. So let's not sit back and wait for perfection before we stand up to serve God.

Rahab's obedience showed real courage- for following Jesus always involves risk.

Traitors have always been treated very harshly by the countries they betray, and Rahab would certainly have been killed had she been discovered hiding the spies. Her decision took real courage and involved real risk. But then, being a wholehearted and faithful follower of Jesus often does.

Like Rahab, all of those on the Hebrews 11 list faced danger as they put their trust in God and obeyed His call on their lives. Some, like Rahab and Moses, escaped to live long lives; others like Abel, Samson and many of the prophets, lost their lives because of their obedience to God.

Only God knows what our tomorrows will bring- but whatever the outcome of standing up for Jesus Christ in this life, the glory of the future God has prepared for those who follow Christ surely outweighs the risk and the cost we may face. To be known as a courageous Christian means showing great courage and remaining faithful to God whatever the risk and whatever the cost. What will that look like for us, I wonder? Whatever it is, may God give us the same kind of courage that Rahab had.

Five Churches pulling together to Save the Church Bells

ARTS AND CRAFTS EXHIBITION & TRAIL RAISING FUNDS FOR THE REPAIR & RESTORATION OF THE BELLS

AT BROADHEMPSTON CHURCH

12th - 15th SEPTEMBER 2025

10am to 4pm each day

This is an exhibition displaying and selling local artist's work and crafts, exhibited throughout the 5 Churches in the Beacon group. The trail goes between St Marys, Denbury; St John the Baptist, Woodland; Holy Trinity, Torbryan; St Andrew's, Ipplepen; and St Peter and St Paul, Broadhempston and there is an interesting booklet to guide you on your way. Refreshments will be available in all the churches as well as unique gifts to purchase. The churches are open each of the days 10.00am to 4.00pm

St Peter and St Paul, Broadhempston stands on the site of a Saxon church. The tower is the oldest part of the current church, and some 13th century fabric survives in the restored chancel. The building otherwise mainly dates to the 15th century, including the screens, and was restored and parts rebuilt in the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

Today, however, the bells are held by wooden foundation beams that have significant rot and deterioration in two, possibly three, of the beams and therefore bell ringing has ceased because of health and safety risks. As with all repairs, there is lots to do once you get started and bringing down the bells to let the work commence is very costly. Also, at the same time there is repair work to the roof that needs to be dealt with.


FURTHER INFO;
