
Last week we looked at 5 reasons to trust the Bible- and especially the Old Testament. Today our eyes turn to the New Testament. Here are 5 reasons why we should trust the New Testament to tells us the truth of Jesus and what it means to follow him:

- 1: Style: It's written as history. Many of us have realistic fiction on our bookshelves. Whether spy novels or love stories, they are written realistically to the period in which they are set. But at the time of Jesus, this genre was many centuries away from being invented. 2000 years ago, writing was either fantasy fiction like Greek myths or historical reporting. The Bible is clearly not a fantasy fiction, and in fact the gospels and Acts (the history books of the New Testament) claim to be a true record of all that happened. (See Luke 1:1-4 and John 20: 30-31). The New Testament was written as history so we should read it as it is
- **2: Honesty: It's full of the flaws and failings of the disciples.** If you were inventing a religion and writing down stories to try and convince people to believe a lie, you would <u>not</u> write the New Testament as we have it. For example, the flaws and failings of the disciples and early leaders, their doubts and missteps, are there for all to see. Nor would you have the first witnesses to the resurrection being women. Their testimony was not acceptable in court. Neither would you include descriptions of the disagreements within the early church. All of this makes the Christian message, the church, and its leaders look bad. The honesty of the New Testament speaks volumes about its trustworthiness.
- **3:** Contemporary: It's written so close to the times in which the events occurred. Some people claim that the New Testament, and especially the gospels, were written a long time after the events and are just a myth. Perhaps Jesus did some amazing things, they say, but as the message was passed on the half-remembered stories were embellished until eventually the myth of Jesus was created. But that is simply not true. Myths take centuries to develop, but all of the gospels were written within living memory of Jesus' life, death and resurrection, so that those who were there could have contradicted the accounts of what was included. What's more, those who wrote the gospels were either eyewitnesses or spoke to eyewitnesses who were there themselves. The closeness to the action helps us trust what the Bible says to be true.
- **4: Archaeology: It's backed up by discoveries**. Whether it is the place names mentioned in the New Testament or the names of the people that are used, or events taking place in the wider world, time and time again the Bible's history and the way it describes the world tallies with archaeological discoveries and what we know about life in that region 2000 years ago. For

example, an inscription confirm Pilate's title as a prefect or governor. A long-missing pool with 5 covered colonnades was discovered in the late 1950s, backing up the description of such a place in John 5. And non-Christian historians, like Josephus and Tacitus, speak of the key events of Jesus life. As I said last week, there has never been an archaeological discovery that has proved that what the Bible says is untrue. In fact, quite the opposite. Archaeology supports the Bible.


5: History: It makes sense of how history has unfolded. There's no doubt that the New Testament contains things that the 21st century sceptical mind finds hard to accept. This is especially true about the resurrection of Jesus. Dead people, and especially those killed in a public and brutal way, don't come back from the dead. Yet the only thing that makes sense of the growth of the Christian faith and the willingness of the disciples who claimed to have seen Jesus alive to keep holding on to that claim, is that Jesus actually rose again, as the Bible said he did. Plenty of people die for things they believe to be true. No one risks their life for something they know to be a lie unless there is some other reward waiting. Unless Jesus was raised, the disciples faced death for nothing. But praise God Jesus was raised! And that fact explains how history has unfolded and helps us believe everything else the New Testament has to teach us.



Please note that the PGS website will be taken offline from 3pm Monday 13 October, remaining unavailable until the new system launches on Thursday 30 October.


During this time, we will be unable to register or amend regular or one-off gifts. Those using contactless devices connected to PGS will be unaffected.


