### FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Friends,

In the last of this series of articles about why we can trust the Bible, we're going to focus on how we can know that the Bible hasn't been changed and edited over time.

That's actually a claim that Islam makes as it seeks to discredit the New Testament's account of the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. But it's also something I've heard atheists and even some churchgoers speak of as if it were a fact! So how do we know that the good news of Jesus as we have it recorded for us in the New Testament is actually what the first authors wrote? After all, the Bibles we have in our churches are a new translation done in the last 20 years. And even if we read the King James Bible, it's still not written in its original language and only dates to just over 400 years old?

The first thing we need to note is that Bibles are translated from the oldest complete manuscripts. This is a rigorous process with many checks and balances, so that those who read say, an English translation, can be confident that every care has been taken to translate the original Hebrew or Greek language as carefully as possible. But what about the original manuscripts that are used? How trustworthy are they?

When it comes to the examination of ancient written sources, there are three key questions which need to be addressed. What is the date of the writing? What earlier sources are employed in the writing? And how well preserved are the manuscript copies of the writing and how many are there? On all three questions the New Testament scores incredibly well.

**The date of the writing:** I touched on this last week, but just to remind you, the commonly accepted dates for the gospels are in the 60s for Mark, the 70s and 80s for Luke and Matthew, and the 90s for the gospel of John. That means that within 40 years of Jesus' death we have at least one full biography, with another two following ten years later. Compared to other ancient and well-regarded sources such as the biography of Alexander, or the Annals written by a roman historian called Tacitus, this is amazingly near to the

events. Even non-Christian sources which mention Jesus are far closer to the events than other well-respected books about other historical figures.

**What earlier sources are employed in the writing?** It seems clear from the beginning of Luke's gospel, that in drawing up an account of the life of Jesus, Luke used earlier written accounts alongside his own interviews. Biblical scholars have various names for these unknown manuscripts, because all of them are now lost to us. However, the fact that there are even earlier written records of the things Jesus did and said is astonishing and takes us even closer to the time of Jesus. Comparing Luke's Gospel to the earlier Gospel of Mark, we can see how Luke has acted to conserve earlier portions of writing, rather than adapt them. This should give us great confidence in how the gospel writers went about their task.

The last question is the clincher: **How well preserved are the manuscript copies of the writing and how many are there?** A table might be useful here:

What's more, this number for the New Testament does not take into account the huge number of fragments and partial copies of the New Testament that exist, some of which are almost complete in themselves and date to the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> centuries. Many of these are held in the British Museum.

This vast number of manuscripts across different the languages means that any differences between the various copies, more likely errors in the hand-copying of the texts, stand out. This makes the original text clear and means that we can be very sure indeed that the text of the New Testament has not been altered over time. And in the very rare cases where there are words or sections where there is a doubt, (like the Mark 16: 9-20) our church Bibles make a note of that for us to see.

So apart from the language in which we read the texts, the Bibles we have in our pews and homes haven't changed over the years. The clarity and age of the texts along with the care of the translators means that we can trust the Bible to tell us the truth of Jesus. That

leaves two questions: Will we believe what the scriptures tell us? And how will we respond to it? Peter's response to Jesus in John 6: 68 gives us the best response: "**Lord to who else shall we go? You have the words of eternal life!**" May we be those who read and believe the gospel and find for ourselves the true and eternal life Jesus offers.

## **Reflection of my time as an Anna Chaplain by Kim Martin**

My commissioning took place in March 2025 at St Paul's Church, Newton Abbot and what a gift it has been.

I initially assisted my Rector in taking services in three of our care homes but since branching out on my own we now have capacity to cover ten of our care homes.

This has been a great privilege and Jesus has blessed me in so many ways. I have taken members of my congregation to assist me when taking services and even though they have asked to come again I've yet to persuade any of them to journey alongside me as an Anna Chaplain or Anna Friend, but it is early days!

Initially I felt really guilty because I believed I was getting more from my visits than my residents. My services range from 3 participants to 19 participants and even though every home has a range of challenges to a new Anna Chaplain, I have thrived on the variation. I take services every fortnight with a reading, short talk, prayers and at least four hymns which they sing with gusto.

The hardest part of my ministry, and the part I hadn't even thought about when I took on this role, was the residents that I would be walking alongside that were 'end of life'. It has been a real privilege to minister to the men and women that I have shared the gospel with, or chatted to, and to meet family members, as we have shared stories of their lives prior to them dying. I have also had the benefit of attending funerals of several of the residents which have been services of thanksgiving and joy for their long lives.

Earlier this year I attended several summer fetes was asked to open and bless a newly decorated quiet room and have often taken Tilly, the collie, up to meet the residents, which brings a smile to their faces as the photos show.



My project in October is to bring some of the residents down from the homes I work in, to our church, to join in Holy Communion with our Wednesday morning congregation. This is going to be followed by a light lunch of soup and sandwiches, crumble and cakes, tea and coffee in our church hall. This will give the residents a chance to participate in a church service on a larger scale than what they have been use to in their home, and to be able to socialise with other like-minded people.

This hopefully gives you all a flavour of what carrying out my Anna chaplaincy role is for me. It's varied, at times sad, most of the time joyful, and I still buzz with enthusiasm.

## **Our New Mission Partner: Rachael Muluuta.**

From January 2026, we will have 3 mission partners: Barnabas Aid, Christians Against Poverty Teignbridge, and **Rachael Muluuta**.

**Rachael works with Word of Life Uganda to help young people grow in their love and knowledge of God and live as Christ's disciples.**

Rachael supports churches across Uganda by providing Bible teaching, training and discipleship for women, children, youth and their leaders. She also runs small group Bible studies, reads the Bible with people one-to-one and teaches at various events. Rachael delights in Jesus, loves spending time with people and having adventures in her trusty (or should that be temperamental!) Land Rover.



Rachael married Bernie in April 2020, and they are both currently studying at Oak Hill Theological College, London, prior to returning to Uganda fulltime in 2027.
