FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Friends

Over the last 2 weeks we've looked at Paul's calling after a dramatic encounter with Jesus, and his lifelong calling, which he fulfilled despite regularly facing extreme persecution and opposition. Today we're taking a brief look at the reason behind his perseverance in that calling, namely the glorious hope he had in Christ, and that we can have too.

The best summary of Paul's many challenges comes in 2 Corinthians 11, when Paul, who is defending his apostleship to the rather fickle Corinthian church, writes this:

I have worked much harder, been in prison more frequently, been flogged more severely, and been exposed to death again and again. Five times I received from the Jews the forty lashes minus one. Three times I was beaten with rods, once I was pelted with stones, three times I was shipwrecked, I spent a night and a day in the open sea, I have been constantly on the move. I have been in danger from rivers, in danger from bandits, in danger from my fellow Jews, in danger from Gentiles; in danger in the city, in danger in the country, in danger at sea; and in danger from false believers. I have laboured and toiled and have often gone without sleep; I have known hunger and thirst and have often gone without food; I have been cold and naked. Besides everything else, I face daily the pressure of my concern for all the churches. Who is weak, and I do not feel weak? Who is led into sin, and I do not inwardly burn?

Reading that list does make one wonder why, and how, Paul kept going! There are enough crushing challenges here to floor a whole church, let alone one man! So how did Paul keep going? What was the hope that fuelled him and led him on?

Paul expressed that hope in a number of ways: On trial before the Sanhedrin in Acts 23:6 he said: *'I stand on trial because of the **hope** of the resurrection of the dead.'* In his later trial before Felix in Acts 26:6, Paul spoke of the ancient origin of that hope. *'And now it is because of my **hope** in what God has promised our ancestors that I am on trial today.'* Later, in prison in Rome Paul expressed his hope this way in Romans 5: *'Therefore, since we have been justified through faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ,² through whom we have gained access by faith into this grace in which we now stand. And we boast in the **hope of the glory of God.**'*

So, Paul's HOPE was based on God's ancient yet certain promises. It was linked to life after death- *the resurrection from the dead* – and it was the hope of seeing and even sharing in the glory of God. Such was Paul's confidence that God would fulfil this promise to all who repent and believe in Jesus, that he not only persevered under such extreme pressures, but he also prayed for the eyes of other believers to be opened fully to see and understand all that God's promises meant. So, for example, in his pastoral prayer in Ephesians 1 Paul writes this: *'I pray that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened in order that you may know the hope to which he has called you, the riches of his glorious inheritance in his holy people and his incomparably great power for us who believe.'*

As Paul's eyes were opened to the wonder of all that God had planned and prepared for him (and all believers) so the things of earth became strangely dim, in the light of God's glory and grace. If Paul's ambitions were earth-bound, if he was seeking a comfortable life, a secure retirement, a healthy family, a peaceful existence, he would never have taken the gospel out across the empire, nor spent his time writing the letters that continue to shape and build our faith in Christ Jesus. Likewise, if our spiritual ambitions are narrow and comfortable, we will never be moved to risky obedience, active service and sacrificial giving, and our lives, and the life and growth of God's church will be the poorer for it.

So, what is your hope in Christ? How strong is it? In what ways does it show itself in your life and decisions? As we reflect on these things, may we, like Paul, be increasingly *joyful in **hope**, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer* (Romans 12:12), that the good news of the gospel might spread and grow and multiply in our day too!

Lent Focus on Prayer- and our Lent Course

Lent begins on Wednesday 18th February, when we shall be having a special ***Ash Wednesday Communion Service with the imposition of Ashes*** at St Paul's starting at 10am.

From the following Sunday, our focus of our Sunday sermons will be on Prayer. See below for the topics and Bible readings.

To complement the Sunday teaching, we will also be holding a 5-week Lent course on Prayer. The sessions will be held twice each week: on **Monday afternoons at Abbotsbury Church from 12:30 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. (bring your own lunch)**, and on **Tuesday evenings at St Paul's Church from 7 p.m. to 8:30 p.m.**

The aim of the short course is to put some practical flesh on to the Sunday sermons, allowing us to learn HOW to pray but hearing and doing. Each session will involve some teaching, discussion and a time to put what we have learned into prayer. Further details are below. To help us prepare, please let either Gareth or I know that you are coming.

Session 1: The Heart of the Matter (The "Why")

The Intention: We begin by stripping away the "performance" of prayer to rediscover our identity as children of God. This session aims to move prayer from a religious obligation to a relational conversation, grounded in the opening words of the Lord's Prayer.

Session 2: Prayer in the Dark & The Daily Grind (The "When")

The Intention: This session tackles the reality that life is often either "ordinary" or "overwhelming." We use the raw, unresolved honesty of **Psalm 88** to learn that lament is not a sign of a lack of faith, but an act of trust that refuses to go silent in the dark.

Session 3: The Prayer Menu (The "What For")

The Intention: Many of us get stuck in a "shopping list" style of prayer, where our own needs dominate our time with God. Using the **ACTS** (Adoration, Confession, Thanksgiving, Supplication) model, this session invites us into a more balanced, biblical vocabulary.

Session 4: The Gethsemane Struggle (When Answers Differ)

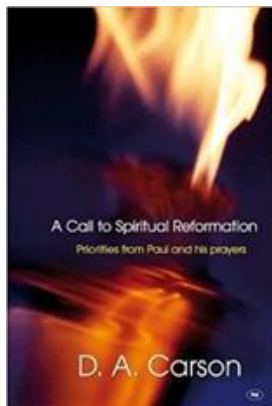
The Intention: This is perhaps the most pastorally sensitive week, focusing on the times when God's answer is "No" or "Wait." We look to **Jesus in Gethsemane** as our ultimate model for honest wrestling that ends in surrendered trust. The intention is to move from "demanding our way" to "trusting His way," acknowledging that surrender is an iterative, daily process.

Session 5: The Still Small Voice (How We Hear)

The Intention: True relationship involves listening as much as speaking. This session focuses on turning our prayer monologue into a dialogue by grounding our listening in the **Living Word of God (Hebrews 4:12)**. Through the ancient practice of *Lectio Divina* and intentional periods of silence, we train ourselves to hear the Shepherd's voice amidst the noise of the world.

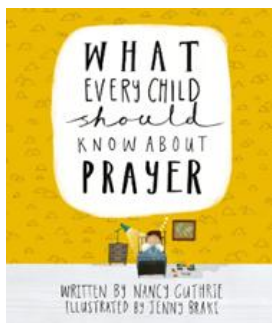
Resource of the Week

God doesn't demand hectic church programs and frenetic schedules: he only wants his people to know him more intimately,' says Don Carson. 'If we are to make any headway in reforming our praying, we need to begin by listening afresh to Scripture and seeking God's help in understanding how to apply Scripture to our lives, our homes and our churches.'

In this book Carson works through several of the apostle Paul's prayers in such a way that we hear God speak to us today, and find strength and direction to improve our praying, both for God's glory and for our good.



Just as the disciples needed Jesus to teach them how to pray, so our children need us to teach them. This book will help!

Best-selling author Nancy Guthrie and much-loved illustrator Jenny Brake team up on this biblical theology of prayer for children. Nancy explains in child-friendly language what prayer is, how and why we should pray, and the things we can pray about.
